ANOTHER MISSING MAN.

Frank Eaton, a farmer who has been renting land about six miles north of

Leal, has been missing for about a month. His brother and the hired man report that about that time he was

driven to Wimbledon, where he intend. ed to take the train to Kensal for the purpose of purchasing a team of horses. It is reported that he had about \$300

in his possession at that time, Since then he has not been heard from, There were a good many circum-

stances connected with his disappearance which looked suspicious, and which indicated that perhaps there had been foul play. Eaton was in pretty good shape financially. He had a fair crop, only a portion of which had been threshed, and had already commenced

to clean up some of his small outstanding accounts. He was a married man. His wife and daughter recently left for Minnesota for a visit, with relatives. If he was a drinking man it might have been thought that he had gone off on a spree, but it is stated that he was of sober habits.

His disappearance caused a good deal of talk in the neighbrhood and as a result warrants were issued for the arrest of the brother and hired man. The premises where they had lived was searched. It is claimed that a pocket book containing about \$75 was found

under the porch, although neither of them had had any money a short time previous. Various small articles re-cently purchased by Eaton were found among the possessions of one or the other of the men, according to report. There was no proof, however, that Eaton was dead, and States Attorney Burke, afer carefully investigating all the circumstances, came to the conclusion that there was no good grounds on which to hold the two men and accordinly moved the dismissal of the

Eaton's father, who lives in Minnesota, was present while the affair was being investigated by the states attor-ney and ridicules the idea that his son is dead. He says he has disappeared in this matter before, going away without apparent cause and returning when he saw fit. If this is the case there is no apparent reason why the public should take any further interest in the matter.
