Why Ships Have Keels

Why has a big ship three keels? All big warships and large merchant vessels have, in addition to the ordinary keel at the bottom of the ship, two other keels, one on each side below the water line, which are known as bilge keels. They are fitted in order to reduce the rolling of the vessel, and their success in this is remarkable. Bilge keels add greatly to the comfort of passengers travelling by large ocean-going liners.

The bilge keels are sometimes three or four feet in width, and vary in length to nearly its total length. It was at first thought that bilge keels would reduce the speed of vessels, but this has been proved not to be the case.

Why Salmon Run Fell Off

The latest explanation of the fallure of salmon runs in the Fraser river, Vancouver, during the last few years comes from a coastal Indian who believes that the salmon have been offended by the prevalence of jazz music.
