Miss Anne Sortland sister of the groom played Mendelssohn's wedding march for the processional.

The decorations in the living room were carried out in pink and green color note, with pink and white peonies, roses and pink tapers. English Ivy formed an improvised arch where the vows were spoken.

The groom's attendants, Arthur Olson and Arthur Sortland, brothers of the bride and groom, headed the bridal procession.
