"Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Werner returned from their Fargo trip Wednesday. On the road going up they had a close call to a very serious accident when a wheel came off their car without warning. The car turned over and landed in a ditch filled with water. Mrs. Werner and baby were in the car and escaped without injury except Bill who received only a slight cut over the eye. A few feet from where they went in the ditch was a large culvert and had they hit this it is hard to tell what the consequences might have been.

They were driving at about 45 miles per hour when the accident happened and when the wheel came off, the car rolled over twice and landed in a ten foot ditch with about three feet of water. Mr. Werner lays their luck in not being seriously injured or killed to the fact that the car top did not crush but held the full weight of the car up. It was a Dodge car.

It was one of the luckiest and at the same time one of the most sensational spills of the season. The friends of Mr. and Mrs. Werner are happy to be able to congratulate them on their lucky escape."

"Cracked Gasoline"
