

The Constitutional Amendments

Our constitution is a set of guarantees of protection for certain ideals of government, under which citizens of this state have built and are building homes, and otherwise employ their earnings in the pursuit of welfare and happiness. To make any extensive change in these guarantees [amending the constitution] is to interfere seriously with the plans and property of home owners and all citizens who are affected. It is therefore important that we should be very careful in advocating or bringing about any such changes for fear we bring about conditions that might injure ourselves and our neighbors.

Realizing even that the best of us sometimes get excited and hastily do things that are damaging to ourselves, provision was wisely made in our constitution so we could not disturb it without the lapse of sufficient time to take a second thought.

An extensive disturbance of our constitution is now proposed in the form of a number of amendments. It is therefore time for us to take that second thought.

The constitutional amendments that are proposed should be carefully studied and information pertaining to them obtained from any and every source possible, so that we may vote wisely at the fall election. Some of them may be good and some very dangerous. They should be discussed thoroughly and continually from now until time to vote. For that purpose the attention of our readers is called to an analysis of some of the amendments in this issue as presented by people who question the wisdom of adopting them.

Letter from H. L. Hill

U. S. S. Leviathan
Sept. 20, 1918

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Howden:—

Often think of you folks and my good intentions have been to write you, but the new life I am leading uses up most of my spare time.

Have been across several times and as you I am in the Naval Overseas Transportation Service, a very thrilling and interesting branch of the service. Can't go into details and ex-

plain everything pertaining to it as I would like. Some time I will, in detail tell you all about it in person if an all kind Providence permits.

Very interesting: I am a 32d degree Mason and have hopes of taking the shrine if I ever get on shore long enough at one time. The lodges here in the east cut the price considerable to men in uniform and we all take advantage of it; six hundred in my class.

While in France the other day I picked up a souvenir for Mrs. Howden. I don't approve of the color but it is war times and we can't be particular, so you have a souvenir of France; don't frame it.

Like my new work fine, Officers pleasant and my associates congenial, and my Uncle Sam pays me \$41.50 per month all good government money. Travel considerable. Will call you up and let you know I want one of your wonderful meals [want one all the time] I mean when I get the chance to eat it.

See that everyone gets in as strong on the next Liberty Loan as they did on the last. We are into a big game. I know I have a better chance to look it over than you who can't.

Give my warmest regards to all the neighbors and friends.
