Corporal Victor Simenson arrived home last Saturday from Camp Dodge, where he received his honorable discharge from the army. Victor has grown taller and heavier than when he enlisted in 1917, and is a good specimen of the American soldput the finishing iers who touches to the war. He has seen lots of strenuous service as he went into the trenches February 7, 1918, remaining there practically all the time until the war closed. In addition to the usual raids and sniping parties he saw service in the battles of : Soissons, St. Mehiel and battles in the Argonne, coming out without a scratch or mishapexcept a dose of mustard gas. He is able to tell lots about his experiences, and about the country and conditions over there, and has only to appear in public and an interested audience is soon assembled. He has not formed any plans vet as to his future, but says he is going to take a good rest before going to work at anything.
