Only one alternate, Julius Martinus Bjorgo, has been selected at this writing.

Thirty-four men will leave on October 3rd, and eleven more as soon thereafter as practicable, which will complete the quota.

One of the men in this group will be selected by the local board to be in charge of the men who will leave on the 19th.

As such he will assume a great deal of responsibility, having charge of all the meal, railroad and sleeping car tickets, and reporting the disposition of same, together with being responsible for the delivery of the men under him at the mobilization camp at the specified time as well as their behavior enroute. The government charges him with being especially cautious that the men do not have access to any intoxicating liquor while on the trip, or are left at any of the stops along the road. He also has the mobilization orders to deliver to the adjutant at the

camp together with copies of the original registration cards and physical examination blanks of all the men in his party, and must report by telegraph to the Adjutant of the time of his arrival and explain any delay causing him not to appear as ordered.

Since setting the above the boys have left Cooperstown, Ed Bolkan, one of their number, having charge of the company.
