Peter Fried was born in Jenatz, I Switzerland, March 24, 1844, and it when twelve years of age re-moved with his parents to Foun-tain City, Wis. There he grew in to man's estate and lived eighty

teen years, and later removed to a Arcadia, where he engaged in the farm machinery business for in

four years.
In 1878 he heard of the opportunities in the then territory of Datota and he removed to Stutsman county, taking up a pre-emption and tree claim of 160 acres ption and tree claim of 160 acres each some ten miles northeast to Jamestowa. There he made chis home and became a pioneer president and a factor in the delyelopment of the country. He had taken up a homestead in Wisconsin but at that time the government was more generous than at present and Mr. Fried acquired title to a helf section of acquired title to a half section of land and later bought many other quarter sections of land in that portion of the country. As his children grew to manhood and womanhood, or married, he pre-sented each to a quarter section As his

land, his blessing and an oppor-tunity to make their own way in the world. Always solicitous of their welfare, he watched over them and in time of stress came to their aid. Living on his orig-inal grant from the government he assisted in making the territory about Fried postoffice, named in his honor, a good place.
