

# Died Last Monday Morning

AFTER A LINGERING ILLNESS  
BODY TAKEN TO OLD HOME  
IN MINNESOTA

Samuel H. Haynes was born in New York state, Dec. 28, 1844. He died in Courtenay, Monday morning, March 30, 1914. The active part of his life was spent in Red Wing, Minn., where his parents brought him when he was six or seven years old. His life occupation was a bookkeeper. He began his career working in various county offices in the court house at Red wing. Later he became bookkeeper of the Goodhire National bank, a position he held for 20 years. While there he had charge of the savings department. His ability as a bookkeeper seems to have been recognized by the social organizations to which he belonged, for he was twenty-nine years, keeper of records for the Knights of Pythias and for a good many years, secretary of his Sunday school. He joined the Methodist church when quite young, probably when about 18 years old and remained an active worker in the church and Sunday school.

The family moved to Courtenay last summer to be with Miss Haynes, who has been one of the high school teachers this year. Since coming here Mr. Haynes has not been very well. Five weeks ago he suffered a slight shock of apoplexy which terminated fatally as already stated.

It has meant a great deal to care for him during his illness and the devotion of both wife and daughter has been worthy of more than a mere passing remark. Miss Haynes has endeared herself to a good many people in school and in church and much real sympathy was shown her and her mother.

A short service was held at their home, Monday afternoon, before leaving for Red Wing, where services were held and where he was laid to rest.

Prof. Chamberlain accompanied them as far as St. Paul.
