It has only been but a month past since she was here visiting with friends, being on her way from Williston, N. D., to Fargo, where she expected to make her future home. While here she made the remark that she was so glad that Fargo was going to be her home, as she felt like she could commence to enjoy some of the pleasures of life, such as is offered one living in a city, but she little knew, at the time she spoke the above words, that death was so near.
