LONG SUFFERER FROM ASTHMA
PASSED AWAY LAST THURSDAY
AT HIS FARM HOME

Last Thursday, March 28th, at his farm home north of town E. L. Skaar succumbed to a long siege of asthma, combined with an attack of pneumonia and bronchitis, and passed away surrounded by his wife and children, the end coming quietly. He had been a sufferer from asthma ever since he was fourteen years old, but the disease did not become serious until about nine days ago when he was taken ill with bronchitis and pneumonia, which proved to be too much for his weak condition. Dr. Shepard was called to attend him but could do nothing, realizing at once that the case was practically hopeless.

Mr. Skaar was born in Primrose, Bame county, Wisconsin, the fourth of December, 1860, and lived with his parents until he was twenty-four years of age. On the twenty-ninth day of January, 1897, he married Miss Rosa Baker, also of Primrose, and together they moved to this state to make their home, locating in what is now Corinne township, a few miles north of here. As a result of their union, they were blessed with four children, three girls and one boy: Cora, who is now 14 years old; Alma, 11; Goldie, 9; and Edwin, 8.

The funeral services were held at the farm home at one o'clock Monday afternoon and then at the Norwegian Lutheran church near the farm, Rev. Thoreson, of Hannaford, conducting the services. Interment was made in the cemetery near the church, a number of friends from here attending.

In his death the community loses one of it's best farmers and old time residents, the wife loses a loving husband, and the children a dutiful father. The bereft family has the sympathy of the entire community.
