A circular has been received at this office from the Associations of Western Railways which urges shippers to begin preparations to prevent a car shortage and states that the indications are that if this is not done at once they will be confronted next October with the worst situation that has existed since October, 1907, just before the panic. Shippers and consignees can greatly help themselves, the railways and all other shippers and consignees by loading and unloading all cars delivered to them as soon as possible and by moving all the lumber, coal, cement and other freight that they can within the next few weeks instead of waiting until the railroads are staggering under the crop movement. The co-operation of the shippers and consignees of the country is needed if the bad situation now threatening is to be averted.
