

MAINTAIN HIGH STANDARD

Six high schools were added to the list of classified high schools by the state high school board which met in Grand Forks last week. Those given state recognition were Buxton, Dazey, Litchville, Mott, Ryder and Wyndmere. Five other schools which applied for classification were refused because they had not quite reached the standard set. Three other schools which had been on the official list were dropped because they, also, had failed to maintain the required standard.

With these changes, the total number of classified schools is 111. These are divided as follows: High schools with courses in agriculture, domestic science and manual training, 5; first class, 38; second class, 21; third class, 47.

At the afternoon session the board went over the high school manual and decided on a few minor changes in the course of study. It was decided to issue a new manual, which will be published soon. The members of the board who were in attendance were President McVoy of the University, President Worst of the agricultural college, and Superintendent E. J. Taylor, R. Heyward, state high school inspector, met with the board.
