Seed Grain From Canada

In order to secure clean seed and better seed from the newer lands of the northwest, Congressman Hanna has recently introduced an important bill which provides that from January 1st to March 31st, of each year, wheat, oats, barley or flax may be imported into the United States for seed purposes only, from any of the Provinces of the Dominion of Canada free of duty under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the secretary of the treasury.
