Most everybody that you see come to town these days come in with a truck wagon of some kind to haul out lumber to build wheat bins to hold their grain.

The average of the wheat so far threshed this year is about 25 bushels per acre. Some is running a little over and some a little less, all depending on the kind of ground it was sowed on and whether early or late sowing.
