**Maple Sugar Trees.**

Within its wide range the sugar maple appears as a predominant tree only in the New England states, New York, southern Canada, northern and western Pennsylvania and in parts of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. In the southern Appalachians it occurs in scattered bodies where climate conditions are similar to those of the north. In the extreme northern part of New York state and the adjacent district of Quebec the forest growth is often almost pure maple and even considerably farther south, where beech and birch become associate trees, the sugar maple holds its own as the dominant species. In northern Pennsylvania at an altitude of over 1,000 feet the mixture is much the same as it is in New York. In Ohio, Indiana and Illinois a similar condition is found. But as the hilly country disappears the maple retreats to the richer and damper soils, leaving great areas to the oaks and chestnuts.—Bulletin of the Department of Agriculture.
