As an indication of the extreme cattle shortage that exists all over the country one of the representative experts of the better farming movement in this state, was sent to purchase 100 head of fine, high grade young dairy cows. There were to be apportioned among farmers who are co-operating with the better farming movement and who are anxious to secure high-grade 2-year-old dairy cows as the foundation for herds. The gentleman was instructed to secure nothing

but the best. He spent three weeks and brought back only 21 young cows. The demand for milk, the effort of so many farmers to enter dairying, the ruthless killing in past years of young stock, have conspired to create the greatest shortage ever known.

Explorations in Palestine Show The Ancients Attained Much Importance to Records.

Prof. George A. Reiser of Harvard university discovered among some specimens of earliest Hebrew writing in the excavations of the city of Samaria, in Palestine, a most interesting record of the first pure food laws in history. He also found ancient writings dealing with the first instance in record of the keeping of wines in a government warehouse under bond. Dating back to the period of King Ahab, 850 B. C., these inscriptions are considered to be one of the greatest finds of the Harvard Palestine expedition which delved into the city of Ahab and Amri for three years. They found labels on wine and oil jars. These mentioned the year in which the wine was laid down in the cellars of the palace storerooms, and they state the vineyard from which the wine came, important facts that are recognized equally well by vintners today. On the oil jars the labels read: "A jar of pure oil," with the mention of the district from which the oil came. The bits of pottery on which the descriptions were written were not parts of the jars, but were evidently intended to be attached to the necks of the receptacles, just as are labels or seals at the present time.—Health Culture Magazine.
