

Young Lady Drowns in River

The following article is taken from the Wolf Point, Mont., paper, and narrates the circumstances surrounding the death of Gila Anderson, a daughter of Iver Anderson, deceased, who formerly lived in Dover township:

The city was shocked late yesterday afternoon when it became known that Gila Anderson had been drowned in the Missouri. Miss Anderson, who was the daughter of Mrs. Adolph Vig, of the Southside, had come to town yesterday afternoon to bring her four-year-old brother, "Buddy" Vig, to the doctor. The little boy had been playing around some machinery and had got one finger caught and crushed so badly that, upon examination, the doctor stated that it would have to be amputated. The sister did not want to take the responsibility of having this done so wired Mr. Vig who is at Hannaford, N. D., to come home. Then she and Henry Pipal, a neighbor who had brought her in in his car, started to return to the Vig home.

They had crossed to the other side of the river on the ferry and Mr. Pipal cranked the car preparatory to driving off the boat. The car must have been left in reverse gear for when the engine started it backed rapidly against the apron, which it is reported, was not locked, and which gave way, letting the car run off into the water. The car was a Maxwell with a torpedo body and the top was up. Bystanders say they saw Miss Anderson attempt to get out of the car when she saw what was happening, but as the car sank in the water, the top struck her shoulder and forced her down. She must have managed to push the little boy free of the car after they went down into the water, for he was found about sixty feet down the stream, when he was rescued after being in the water several minutes. He will probably suffer no ill effects from the experience. Expert divers tried repeatedly to locate the body of the girl, and the river in the vicinity of where the car went down was dragged with a seine, but it was not until this forenoon that it was discovered about fifty or sixty rods from where the accident occurred. The body was brought to Wolf Point and funeral arrangements awaited the return of Mr. Vig from North Dakota.

Gila Anderson was about 21 years of age. She was a girl of sweet dis-

position and had always remained at home and helped her mother care for the large family of children. She was a sister of Mary, Inga and Luella Anderson, who live in Wolf Point, and whose many friends deeply sympathize with them in their sorrow.
