Farm Wages

Peoples Opinion: County Agent T. X. Calnan says that farm wages will be considerably lower this summer than during the past two years. He states that according to wage reports and information relative to same received at his office from farm bureau agents of this state and South Dakota and Minnesota, the general scale of wages that will prevail in Barnes county this season will be between \$40 and \$45 per month. At a meeting held at Wheaton, Minn., some time ago it was planned to keep the wages in the three states as nearly uniform as possible. It is planned to file information weekly concerning the conditions in various communities and this will be posted in public places where the farmers may see them. While it is not possible to keep absolutely the same scale in each state, it is believed that wages in general will be practically the same in all three of the states.
