The house on the Donald Campbell farm, now owned by James Beattie, was totally destroyed by fire last of Friday morning. Mr. Beattie had started a coal fire in the kitchen t stove and had gone out to the barn t to do the morning chores. It is of thought that the smouldering coal t generated gases which exploded. S thus setting fire to the kitchen 0 woodwork. The other occupants of r the house were still sleeping and shut off from the kitchen by two 1closed doors so the smoke and heat a of the fire was not noticed until it 0 had gained great headway and there • was just barely time enough for the ·people in the house to escape, and . practically none of the household n goods were sayed from the flames. s So rapid was the spread of the flames đ that there was not even time to save . a gold watch and about \$150 in e cash belonging to members of the o household, and this together with all other clothing, furniture and perr sonal effects were consumed by the t flames. This was one of the largest . and best farm residences in this part n of the county and the loss to Mr. n Beattie will be very great, though, e fortunately the building and cond tents were insured to the amount of r \$3500. There is no misfortune so great, however, that it might not have been worse; had the wind been in a little different direction some of the other splendid farm buildings might have been destroyed, and fortunatit was too, that in such a quick spreading fire, no lives were lost.
