I have seen them twice since we were n parted. From what they say I take e it that they are well satisfied with their lot. And I must say the same 1 for myself. We get three square meais a day; breakfast at 6, dinner e at 12, and supper at 5 o'clock, bec sides plenty of work and drilling. What more can a right-minded man expect? Of course it is rather hard t for an officer when he gets to drilling - a lot of bone-heads like myself and a few others. However, they show a . good deal of patience and are good fellows all of them. Captain Hartness is our captain and a real good fellow.
