Perhaps, the noblest and most inspiring figure in the whole forest is the King. Viewed from any side, from any angle it is grand indeed. Its name as the reader might guess is derived from the thin crownlike upper layer, as well as from its isolated position and noble aspect. Camping parties always make it a point to lunch in the vicinity of this rock. It is the central figure, the one object of greatest interest in this place of many wonders.

Another is called the Sentinel. Isolated and alone it stands apart from the rest, a huge column on the grassy plain, keeping watch on the frontier.

One looks like a huge ocean liner stuck up on end and supported by a circular pedestal only a few feet in diameter. Some call it the Titanic.

Often high up on the pinnacle of a tall column there rests a balanced rock. As you look it seems to sway in the wind. You expect it to fall at any moment. Unconsciously you make a wide detour.

Thus I could go on without end telling of the interesting figures, strange shapes, and peculiar formations that are found here in such numbers. It is such a large place. To see it all and see it right a week's stay with a good camping outfit and horses to ride is necessary.

Parties are often made up on Sundays or holidays, at La Fundicion, that make the trip out and back the same day. With an early start they are afforded many hours in the forest. But even at that they are enabled to see but a very small portion of what there is to be seen.

In the states one hears much about the Garden of the Gods in Colorado. It is widely advertised by the railroads and the tourist agencies. It is talked about by all those who have visited it. But when it is compared with this practically unheard of wonder in the high Andes it sinks into insignificance. Where the Colorado garden is measured by a few hundred acres this is a dozen times as large, where it has ten strange shapes this has a thousand. One can be seen in an hour or two the other needs a week. There is nothing in the world to compare with the Andean Garden of the Gods. It is one of nature's greatest works of art.

There is one great drawback in connection with visiting this wonder and that lies in the great altitude at which it is located. Tourists when

they have to climb to an elevation of 14,000 feet, lose the interest they might have had. It is not like getting of the train at night, sleeping well in an up-to-date hotel and then after a hearty breakfast, stepping out on the back porch and seeing it all thru a pair of field glasses. On the contrary the highest railroad in the world has to be traveled, snow capped mountain ranges have to be crossed, and the tortures of Sorochie, the dreaded sickness of the high altitude have to be endured. After reaching La Fundicion or Cerro de Pasco, days may pass before one feels fit to leave his room or venture out, not to mention mounting a horse and riding for three hours over a broad pampa to the outskirts of the Rock Forest. But if one has the patience and the nerve to brave these obstacles and to stick it out he will be amply rewarded by seeing that which is to be found nowhere else. If the world really possesses seven great wonders, this is surely the eight. And among the rest it is not the least.
