The fact that his paper was not designated by the commissioners as one of the official papers of the county, is made the basis of a column article in which the other publishers of the county, county officials and commissioners are handed a package of slurs and insinuations that it must have taken every ounce of his ingenuity to concoct.

Judging from the rabid fulminations of the Sutton editor, the papers that were appointed as official, used every kind of underhanded means to secure the appointment.
