It was a shock of no small momentum that came to this commun ity Saturday, Dec. 15th, when It learned that John Wam had passed away at St. Lukes Hospital, Fargo. He had been sick for some Last October he had hemorrhages to such an extent that he lost a large part of his blood. But he became better and hoped to recover his health by an operation for ulcers of the stomach. According to the doctors he had had these for years, and as a consequence he had not been in good health. The operation was, however, of a much more serious nature than the surgeons suspected, but threre were hopes for his recovery until hemorrhages again set in the Wednesday following his first operation. Another operation then became necessary to save him long enough so his family could reach Fargo.

Interment took place at the cemetery by St. Olaf's Church at Walum Dec. 19th. Rev. P. A. Thoreson officiated and Rev. Njust of Coop-Beautiful erstown also spoke. wreaths were placed on the coffin by the Congregation and by the Ladies Aid. The grave was very beautifully draped by the Young Peoples' Society of Walum.

John Wam was born April 2nd, 1860, at Lillestrommen, Norway. He came to this country about thirty years ago. He lived for some years in Chicago, St. Paul and Hudson, Wis., before he came to this community where he became known i among its foremost citizens.
