## Daylight Saving Is Law

St. Paul Dispatch: Reference was made in these columns quite recently to the opposition which is prevalent in agricultural districts to the plan of daylight saving embodied in the Federal statute. It has developed since that a misunderstanding of the situation is quite as general. The impression prevails that the setting forward of the clock was a war measure directed toward stimulating production and it was for last summer only. The fact is that congress enacted the system into law and it will continue in force until it is repealed. At 2 a. m. on the last Sunday in March of each year, the clock must be set forward one hour and on the last Sunday in October, at the same hour, there is a return to standard time.
