On August 39, 1918, John A. Syverson resigned as Chairman of the Chapter to answer the country's call at which time G. B. Edmondson was appointed to fill this vacancy.

The Chapter and Branch officials are all of high moral standing and prominent in their respective communities, each serving with patriotic faithfuliness and devotion in the performance of their official duties. The willingness of the people of Griggs County to serve is reflected in the large membership which approached the 2000 mark, and also in funds subscribed in response to various calls from the National Red Cross to aid in carrying out its splendid ministry to the suffering armies and oppressed people of Europe through 'The Greatest Mother of Them All' the Amercan Red Cross.

As a means of raising funds the Chapter officials instituted a series of auction sales. Live stock and merchandise were contributed and the proceeds from these sales thruout the county constituted the largest part of the funds needed to carry on the work. Money was also ob-tained through monthly pledges. and from receipts of church picnics and other sources. The total receipts aggregate \$30,000.00 and the financial reports of parent Chapter and Branches show a balance of \$4.

The work of production was first carried on at the Berg Memorial Gymnasium. When the public school opened the Courthouse was secured and work continued for some time. Later the Northern Light Lodge granted the use of the commodious and comfortable banquet hall of the temple which has since been occupied by the Red Cross workers.
