The yields as shown by early threshing reports, vary greatly, but the estimated damage done by the rust and blight does not seem to have been exaggerated. There are a few fields of wheat that have gone as high as sixteen bushels to the area but by far the larger area will as ligh as sixteen bushels to the acre, but by far the larger grea will yield only from three to six bushels of very light wheat. Onts and barley are reported as a light crop. Winter rye and flax apparently are the best crops, but in places even these have been damaged by hall and grasshoppers. Corn at the present writing is still very promising and the bay area.

and grasshoppers. Corn at the present writing is still very promising and the hay crop is of the best.

Weather conditions for wheat were good this year with the exception that the wet weather of early spring caused seeding to be delayed too long. Then a period of hot weather and abundant moisture at the heading out time caused the too long. Then a period conventer and abundant moisture at the heading out time caused the grain to grow too rapidly, rust developed and the grain was officted causing a low yield and poor grade. Much of the wheat will be ground and used for feed.

Even under these present conditions of poor yields this part of the state can consider itself forfunate in comparison with other parts of the country. Reports from as far

state can consider itself forfunate in comparison with other parts of the country. Reports from as far south as Texas, and extending over great portions of Canada are that yields are poor, no matter what the staple crop is. Some sections like Montana are entirely burned out, and fermors from that state are in and farmors this very vic and fermors from that state are in this very vicinity buying, baling and shipping straw and hay to carry their stock through the winter. So, all things considered, this community may regard itself fortunate in spite of disappointment in not being able to harvest a bumper crop.
