I was on the list of those soon to be sent home, and)) could have gone but for myself. Friday morning they called for twenty volunteers for military police duty, out of that bunch and only three of us volunteered, myself being the first. The rest had to be drafted. I am feeling fine now so thought • since I had done so very little so far, here was a chance to make up for it at least in part. It may look foolish to you, but that was my way of looking at it, and then it will only keep me on this side perhaps six months or more. We haven't been transferred yet. They say we are to be sent to either France of Germany, but that is only e talk so hardly reliable. No more troops are to be sent from here to France. There are many werse jobs е in the army. A fellow can at least keep neat and clean and has a good place to stay. A fellow must be at least a first class private to become n an M. P. so will be made a first-class when transferred.
