SPRING WHEAT

The acreage of spring wheat in 1919 was much greater and up to June we had the promise of the very best crop on record, yet the weather conditions in many localities were such that in Minnesota, North and South Dakota only about 114,000,000 bushels were harvested, much of it being very chaffy, scabby and shabby and unfit for seed.

More than 80,000,000 bushels have already been marketed and our seed requirements for the three states are about 15,000,000 bushels.

As every grain man knows, the wheat now being shipped is badly mixed, full of trash and light in weight, making much of it unfit for seed.

So it therefore becomes imperative that all of those interested in the prosperity of the Northwest should unite for action, make a local survey of seed conditions and where there is a surplus of good seed, make it known, and where there is a shortage, immediately locate proper seed and make some arrangement for financing it and distributing it to the farmers. If there is any 1918 wheat at your station of good quality, you should see that it is held for seeding? Don't mix it in with the new wheat to make grades. You might possibly save a fraction of a cent, but you will sacrifice many bushels in the next crop.
