Sow Alfalfa Now

May is a good time to sow alfalfa. Grimm is the best seed to sow as it is the hardest. Alfalfa seeded in 3 foot rows will produce seed better than sown in 6 or 8 inch drills and 1 to 2 pounds will be enough seed when sown in rows but when in drills 5 to 6 pounds of seed will be needed in North Dakota.—Extension Division, N. D. Agr. College.

Floyd R. Campbell, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. J. Jacobson, arrived in Walum on Wednesday from overseas, after eighteen months of active service abroad. Floydle, as he is well and favorably known, enlisted with Company F, Second North Dakota National Guard which was later transferred into the Federal service, becoming a part of the 41st Division. While at Camp Mills in the vicinity of New York City, Floyd became ill and did not get to leave with the 41st Division, however, he arrived in France shortly after and became a member of the 26th Division, known as the Yankee Division, which Division saw the longest and hardest service in the front lines, being the First American Division to take charge of a sector. Private Floyd R. Campbell distinguished himself as First Aid Litter Bearer of the 104th Field Hospital connected with the Yankee Division. His enlistment record is as follows: Enlisted July 7th, 1917; Battles, engagements, skirmishes, expeditions: A. E. F. Toul Sector; Pas Finl Sector; Aisne-Marne Offensive; Rup Sector; Mihiel Offensive; Treves Sector; Meuse-Argonne Offensive. He entered the front lines as a member of the Yankee Division on April 5th, 1918, and remained along the front lines until October 26th, 1918, when he was gassed while in the performance of his duties. For a period of about three months after being gassed he was confined to the hospital and convalescent camp. Private Campbell arrived at Boston, Mass., with the Yankee Division on April 18th, 1919, spent ten days at Camp Devins with the Division, then coming west to Camp Dodge where he was mustered out on May 6th, 1919, after an honorable discharge. Private Campbell wears the three gold stripes indicating 18 months overseas service.
