About one A. M. last Wednesday morning fire was discovered in the barn belonging to Ole Sad of Dover township. Within the barn were nineteen head of horses, his harnesses, hay and two hogs. Two of the horses belonged to Gust Ekstrand, including the Percheron stallion Binford. William Angus had written \$500 insurance upon this stallion, which amount was promptly paid.

Word was received here Monday morning that Lewis Swingen had died at a hospital in New Mexico at 10:55 Monday morning, Sept. 29th. Lewis had been in the army for about two years and had seen active service in France where he presumably contracted the disease, tuberculosis, from which he died. Alfred Swingen had already left for New Mexico and will bring the remains of his brother to Lake Mills, Iowa, his old home, where interment will be made. Henry and Tom Swingen and their sister, Mrs. Amanda Larson, will leave tonight for Lake Mills to attend the funeral.
