To the Board of County Commissioners of Griggs County, Dak.:

We the undersigned freeholders of Griggs county would respectfully request you to lay out a public highway beginning at the southwest corner of section 25, Twp. 146, Range 59, running thence east along the section line to the bluff of the Sheyenne river, thence down said bluff in the most practicable and best route for a road to the Sheyenne river at a point 700 feet south from the section line between sections 23 and 25 in town 146, range 59, thence across said Sheyenne river, and thence by the most practicable route back to the section line on the east side of said Sheyenne river.

A Dakota woman was pushed from a train at Bloomington, Ind., the other day. An alleged husband is under arrest for doing the deed.

W. S. Hamer, traveling for a Minneapolis firm, was arrested under the ordinance in Valley City, charged with peddling without a license, but the case was dismissed.

The drought in Massachusetts continues without abatement. The pastures are dried out, stock is fed by foddering, and water for family use sells for 40 cents a barrel in some of the towns.

A rebel 2-cent stamp went through the Richmond postoffice undetected Thursday, and as its color and style is much like the new one, it is feared the old rebel stamps will come out on duty.

Four construction gangs are laying steel rails on the Fargo Southern, and it is now quite certain that the road will be completed by Thanksgiving. This means much to Fargo and North Dakota.

It is reported that the Villard excursion party to the opening, cost the Northern Pacific two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and that employees are to have their salaries curtailed in consequence.

County Treasurer Pease, on his farm of 200 acres south of Sanborn, raised a crop of wheat which netted him \$5.75 profit per acre. Mr. Pease kept a careful account of all expenses and did not do a stroke of work himself. This is pretty good even in Dakota for a "side issue."—Valley City Times.

The long and extensively advertised sale of town lots at La Moure has turned out a miserable failure. The extra inducements and wide spread advertising convinced thinking people that there was a woolly head in the wood pile, and they sensibly stayed away and let the suckers drink the free wine.—Bismarck Herald.

A National Homestead Monument association has been organized at Mitchell, Dak., for the purpose of commemorating the beneficent provisions of the homestead law. It is proposed to erect a shaft 100 feet high in the center of a quarter section of land—160 acres—and ask every settler to contribute one cent for every acre he has secured under the law.
