y A frightful accident courred on Thursay afternoon, at Madison, Wiscensin when ance of money. The wing was 100 feet long, 80 feet wide and 80 feet binh, of solid store and fire proof. All the external work on it had been completed with the exception of a small portion of lining upon the roof, a gang of menbeing employed at the time of the accident upon this work. Two men could be seen to ty feet from the ground waving their lands wildly for sid, while they hung head downward and unable to move their legs, which were crushed securely between heavy timbers. About fifty men were working upon the wing at the time of the casualty, and after all the dead and injured that could be found had been removed from the debris, contractor Nolan got his men together and contractor Nolan got his men together and called the foll, which showed that all were accounted for, when the carch was abendangl. #### Curious Criminal Romance.

A dispatch to the New York Times from Cochecton, O., tells his curious story: About thirty years ago a man came to the village who gave his name as James Gardner.
