

RE-INVESTIGATED.

The Last Surviving Guardsman. Lord Rokey, just deceased, was the last surviving Guardsman who had served in the brigade at Quatre Bras and Waterloo, and the last of those British officers who were present at the Duchess of Richmond's historic ball at Brussels on the night of June 15, 1815, when he listened to the sound of revelry by night, and danced in company with Charles O'Malley, the Irish Dragoon, Fred Power and his dark-eyed senora George Osborn, Captain Dobbin, and the ever fascinating Mrs. Rawdon Crawley.
