The farm garden is too frequently neglected until all the food crops are planted, or at best receives only a little superfluous attention at odd moments. This should not be so. The garden is entitled to the first and principal care, for it is here that sustenance is raised for the most valuable the farm contains—the farmer and his family—against the price of which the value of the entire farm is but a grain of sand.—Northwestern Farmer.

UNLESS a farmer has plenty of water near his stables, and even then he should dig large cisterns for the purpose of watering his stock at certain seasons of the year. A running brook, a lake or a creek is convenient but not more so than a good large cistern. In all instances, where there is not running or standing water handy to the barnyard, farmers have sunk wells and state this they answer a good purpose. Windmills of such a superior character are constructed so cheap that when one is attached to a well for pumping purposes, it makes the well almost equal to a brook, or a lake, but a large cistern can now be built with little expense, and will be found very convenient. It is demonstrated that neither stone nor brick are necessary to build them, all that is required after the dirt or earth is removed, is to apply the cement right on the wall of the excavation. It will be found much better than to stone or brick it up. A cistern made in this way large enough to float a large ship would cost but a few dollars. Those having barns should have cisterns under them. This is good husbandry.—Tower City Herald.

Tariff Exactions.

The grand old party does not seem to be a unit on the tariff question. Read what the New York Times has to say on the subject: For instance a broad cloth dress suit which costs \$50 in New York costs only \$22 in London.

A heavy business suit which costs \$30 in New York costs but \$10 in London.

A spring serge overcoat which costs \$35 in New York costs but \$8.50 in London.

A winter beaver overcoat which costs \$35 in New York costs but \$14.50 in London.

A silk hat which costs \$5 in New York costs but \$3 in London.

These articles altogether cost in New York \$140. In London they cost but \$61. The man who buys these clothes therefore in New York pays \$79 more for them than he could buy them for in London.

What causes the differences in the prices of the two cities?

The man who pays, therefore, \$140 for clothes, on which he pays \$79 taxes.

And where do these taxes go?

If the goods are manufactured in this country not one cent reaches the treasury. It is simply \$79 taken by law from the man who buys \$61 worth of clothes, and given to the man who grows wool and the man who makes cloth.

If the goods are manufactured abroad \$79 goes to a treasury which does not need it, and which can raise all the revenue it requires on whiskey, tobacco, articles of luxury.

In either case the purchaser of the clothes gets absolutely nothing \$79 of the \$140 which he spends.

If on buying the clothes he had to pay \$61 to the collector, and \$79 directly to a tax collector, how long would he stand such extortion?

In result there is not a particle of difference between that system and the present tariff system, according to which he is thus unnecessarily and exorbitantly taxed, not only on his clothing, but on nearly every other necessity of life.

How long will the people of a country which claims to be free submit to this legalized robbery, which those who uphold it, and grow fat upon it, are pleased to call a "protective tariff."
