Farmers are getting through with their seeding very rapidly. Mr. Dazey, of Dazey farm, reports that they will have 1,000 acres sown this week with No. 1 hard. Mr. Gassman has finished seeding his 400 acre farm, and the prospects generally are encouraging for a more than average crop.

Messrs. Allsberg & West intend starting right away with the Dazey school house and will push it rapidly to completion. It will be a credit to the town.

The Northern Pacific superintendent of buildings visited Dazey last week, and informs us that they intend completing the depot at once.

W. L. Pattinson made a visit to Sanborn on Tuesday, and when he returns he will be in a position to afford the means for irrigation. The boys take it internally, and the climate is dry.

Mr. Adams, of the COURIER, visited Dazey on Sunday and inspected the bill of fare at the Pattinson house.

The territorial democratic convention met at Pierre Wednesday. The delegates to the National democratic convention at Chicago are F. M. Herbach, of Bon Homme county, and Mr. McCormick, of Grand Forks; alternates, Stevens of Rapid City, and Watson, of Clark county.

Judge Hudson is now on his way to Yankton to take part in the proceedings of the supreme court which meets on the 14th. One of the most important questions coming before the court is the capital commission bill, an appeal from Judge Edgerton, he having held the bill unconstitutional.—Argus.

The magnificent steamship State of Florida, which collided with the bark Pomona, of Chatham, New Brunswick, was of 4,000 tons measurement gross, 371 feet in length and provided with five water tight compartments which it was supposed would keep her afloat in case of such an accident as proved her destruction. On the night of April 18th, without premonition of their fate, the passengers were aroused from sleep by the vessels striking together, and in twenty minutes the steamship went down stern foremost carrying with her nearly all on board. The crew of the bark were likewise lost, save the captain and one seaman. The few survivors were rescued by the Norwegian bark Thersaa. The accident was appalling in its suddenness. The captain of the steamship in his anxiety to keep cool and preserve his presence of mind acted with such exasperating deliberation that more were lost than otherwise would have been. The total loss of life is one hundred and thirty-four.
