Yankton is paralyzed over the decision of the supreme court sustaining the Capital Commission.

Texas Jack hit the dust before a seven shooter in the hands of the city marshal at Spirit Lake, Ia.

Young & Co., of Milwaukee, who have had a corner in wheat, finished unloading 7,000,000 bushels Saturday.

John C. Eno stole \$4,000,000 from the Second National Bank of New York. His father made good his loss and no prosecution will be instituted.

Alderman Gaynor, who was shot by another ward politician in Chicago, May 13th, is dead. His friends several thousand strong marched on the jail where the murderer was supposed to be confined, but the man had been concealed. However, they have their "oi on 'im, sor."

Messrs. E. H. Steele, of Minneapolis, G. W. P. Bowman, of Chicago, L. S. Warner, of Fargo, and S. W. Sea, of Hope, have incorporated the Northern Pacific Investment company. The object of the company seems to be to catch on to the mighty dollar whenever it shall come within the company's orbit.

They are very fond of hangings in Ashland county, Ohio. Horn and Gribben, two brutal murderers, were hung there last week amid yells and jeers of ten thousand persons, making a gala day of it. Twice in three years have mobs torn down stockades at hangings in that county just to see the fun.

Wm. T. Ditsch, of Smith's Landing, Ill., was detected by a neighbor and friend named Grey in the latter's house with Mrs. Grey in his arms. The weapon used was a .32 calibre Smith & Wesson. The news of the double killing created the wildest excitement. Grey surrendered himself to the authorities.

It is said S. B. Boynton, of Milwaukee, who is digging diamonds at Waukesha, Wis., found two this week, and any quantity of topaz, malachites, sardonyx, chrysolites and garnets—"all very fine."

"N. Dent, an English gentleman, voluntarily came to Dubuque from England Saturday to give his testimony in a petit larceny case. The prisoner was found guilty of stealing a \$19 gun and sentenced to thirty days in jail." What they have done with Dent is not stated. He ought to be president, but he is considered a—otherwise.
