Here and There.

Hiram Sibley, of Rochester, has given \$35,000 to the Cornell mechanical school. Hiram better give us back about \$25 we wasted on his worthless blue grass seed last year.

Heavy frost last week in Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Ontario. Fruit, vegetables and grain were injured. Dakota seems to be out of the frost belt.

May 31st, Col. J. O. P. Burnside, disbursing officer of the postoffice department, an old soldier and a man of high social standing was arrested for embezzlement of funds. He was neither a bull nor a bear—he was simply a sucker that the Wall street sharks swallowed up.

In Wilmington, Delaware, Charles Blake was sentenced for stealing an umbrella, to pay costs and \$6 fine, to stand in the pillory one hour, to receive twenty lashes and to spend three years in New Castle jail. Here is a chance for a brilliant remark, but we won't economize it.

While G. W. Cowdrey, of Valley City, was at church Sunday, his greenhouse came near being destroyed by fire—he loses \$300. Brother Cowdrey ought to have saved the quarter he put in the hat. This should be a warning to all. It was only a year ago last winter that County Clerk Evans froze his ears under like circumstances.

Me Lud Aylsford, who is half English nobleman and half Texas cowboy, got drunk at the English Derby while visiting the 'ome country, and attempted to bulldoze the conductor of a passenger train—wouldn't give up his ticket—hit the conductor with his stick, and the conductor broke his legs. The cowboy doesn't seem to thrive east of the Mississippi.

Refugio Stonez, the Mexican who is to be hanged at San Diego next Friday for murder, has made a full confession, and says that he has committed eleven murders in Texas, all the victims being Americans, and that he deserves his fate. He says he will die game—wonder how being stuffed with red pepper and roasted over a mild fire would suit his rich southern blood.

The administrator of the estate of Charles Ward, who was shot at Devil's Lake in April 1888, protested against the final proof of Alonzo Henshaw, who was supposed to have jumped the quarter section on which the shooting was done; but the protest availed not, as it was shown in evidence that Ward was holding down too many claims for a genuine settler. The Ward boys were evidently very fresh, and, although their killing cannot be justified, they rather invited trouble.

The Dawson Globe is rattling up W. F. Steele, of Kidder county, for trying to get a bill through congress giving him the right to purchase a half section of school lands adjoining Steele, which he had improved. Mr. Steele, by affidavit, claimed that he improved what he supposed to be section No. 17, and finds, that through imperfect markings of the survey, \$30,000 of his improvements are on section 16. He was met before the committee on public lands by affidavits of John Holmes and John VanDensen to the effect that he knew the land was school land when he settled on it, and that the lines were properly marked.

A.—I am destitute of guile. I am in the same boat as Grant—he and I correspond. Grant is innocent and I am innocent, but Ward has acted very ungentlemanly.
