The girl is the daughter of a widow woman living south of Valley City, who, with her family, has been a county charge for some time. The defendant was treating her for falling of the womb. She alleges that he required her to come to his office, and after examining her, committed the crime charged under the guise of treating her for her complaint, she not knowing the nature of the act. She also alleges that under the same statements he repeated the act in the same place. Gen. Wilson, of Fargo, appeared for the prosecution and Messrs. Scott and Andrus for the defense. The examination is progressing as we go to press. The girl first told her story to the wife of the keeper of the poor house and wanted a minister sent for, as she thought she was about to die and needed spiritual treatment. The affair is creating as much excitement as the celebrated "sliff" case last winter. The girl was before the commissioners of insanity Tuesday and Wednesday undergoing examination as to her mental condition. The board found her sane. She is evidently not very bright if not insane, and is not attractive in appearance. Public opinion seems to be divided as to whether there is anything in the case or not.
