Here and There.

Democratic Ohio instructs its delegates for Tilden.

The Asiatic cholera has broken out at Toulon, France. Ten deaths the 27th ult., twelve the 28th. A panic prevails.

The president vetoes the Fitz-John Porter bill, and the old gentleman is where he started from unless the bill can be passed over the veto, which is very improbable.

A little way west of us in McLean county they are lynching the gentle horse thief. Jack O'Neil was used for telegraph pole decoration material and the settlers are mum. Other bad characters have disappeared, and it is feared that they have suicided with what Bill Nye calls "Opium."

F. H. DeVaux, county physician of Barnes county, has been bound over in the sum of \$1,400, to await the action of the grand jury at the next term of the district court. The charge is rape, preferred by Christine Collins, a fourteen year old girl, who has been a county charge some time. The girl is an invalid, suffering with a complaint of the liver which will perhaps result in death. She was treated by DeVaux for falling of the womb. The accused is out on bail, C. F. Thomas and A. C. Kasberg going on his bond.

Jamestown Alert: Ward Bill with a force of men opened two of the large mounds near Bone Hill creek and discovered nothing but an immense pit of bones in each one. A plow was used to excavate the first one and a whole skeleton was discovered, having evidently been buried on its side, as half of the frame, consisting of ribs, shoulder bones, etc., was first seen and when endeavoring to extract it from its resting place it separated in a hundred pieces. Mr. Bill brought two skulls to town, also an immense jaw bone which looks as if its owner might have been one of the antediluvian giants we read about. The jaw has a double row of teeth of immense size all round in a good state of preservation. Other bones of like proportions were unearthed.
