Threshing on the Nelson Bros. farm is completed. Wheat, 12,000; oats, 8,000 bushels.

S. D. Ensign, one of our well-to-do farmers has had the largest yield per acre, so far. Wheat, 34; oats, 50.

Stee & Olstead opened their new saloon with a grand ball Friday night, about thirty couple being present, who enjoyed themselves till the small hours in the morning.
