

THE TALE OF A DOG.

A · certain Nashville statesman is about one of the best story tellers in Tennessee, and his repertoire includes a lot of good ones, fish and otherwise. After figs have been collected they are dipped in boiling brine and then dried on trays for from two to four days, according to the weather. 
