**Sudden Death.**

Halvor Berg died very suddenly last Wednesday evening of heart failure. Deceased had been sickly for several years past but was not any more sick than usual at the time of his death. He had been down town all afternoon and went up to supper to the home of his brother, Mr. Lewis Berg, and went out and sat down on the veranda. A short time afterwards his brother went out to call him to supper and found him practically dead, scarcely any life being left when found. Dr. Wells was hastily summoned but could do nothing. Halvor Berg was born in Fillmore county, Minn., 40 years ago. There are five brothers still left of the family, A. H., Soren, Lewis, John and Anton. The deceased came to Griggs county in 1883, remaining here six years. He then went to the Pacific Coast and remained there two years and then came back to N D, where he has been ever since. He was of a quiet disposition, an upright, conscientious citizen, and his death is regretted by a large circle of friends as well as those of the family. The funeral was held Friday afternoon in the Lutheran church, Rev. E. Silness officiating. The remains were interred in the Cooperstown cemetery. Deceased was an unmarried man.

**Notice to Contractors.**

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids for erecting school house on the southwest corner of northwest quarter of Sec. 9-147-58, Romness township, Griggs county, North Dakota according to the following specifications will be received until the time of meeting to consider such bids September 4, 1902.

Specifications—The building to be 16x24 ft, 10 ft. posts, stone foundation—12 in. high, to be built in good workmanlike manner; sills to be 6x6 in., floor joists 2x10, two feet apart; floor—first shiplap, then tar paper and then 4 in. fur flooring—best grade; outside wall—posts 2x4, 10 ft. high, 2 ft. apart; double plate, shiplap, tar paper and cedar lap siding—knot free; ceiling joists 2x6 in. 2 ft. apart; rafters 2x4 in.

2 ft. apart; common boards, for roof sheathing, then tar paper and best grade cedar shingles; windows—6, three on each side, glass 12x28 in; storm house in front 6x8, double roof, sash with 3 small glass over the door, the school room is to be celled inside with good knot free ceiling, two good large common doors, windows springs for windows, door locks and everything complete, including two out houses 4x5 ft. 6 ft post, 2 ft apart, door locks, etc. A good brick chimney, 6 ft from the floor to 3 ft. above the peak of the roof, 8 in. stove pipe hole, the buildings are to be painted some good color. The school district will furnish all the stone on the spot for foundation, draw all the lumber and material.

The school board reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

The said school house and out buildings to be completed and in proper order for use and accepted by the school board on the first day of October, 1902.

**Our First Horses.**

The first horses imported into America, says a London Journal, were taken over by Columbus on his second voyage in 1493. Thirty years later forty-two horses were landed in Florida, but they all died soon after their arrival. De Soto, who made an expedition to the new world in 1540-41, left a number of fine Spanish horses behind him when obliged to quit the country after his conquest of Louisiana, and this stock is thought to have formed the foundation of the wild horse of the southwestern states. In 1604 a French immigrant brought to Acadia a number of animals from which the modern Canadian pony is thought to be descended. Horses from Flanders were imported into New York in 1623.
