H. P. Smart has returned from an extended trip into the northern part of North Dakota on land and loan business. He found much of the crops in the Red River Valley of an indifferent yield owing to wet weather and to a good many hailed out sections. In Cavalier a much better condition prevails and some of the finest stands of wheat and flax he has seen are found there. Around Rugby on the Bottineau branch, the crops look well and the town of Rugby is growing and having a good many substantial improvements in the way of brick stores and good houses erected. The country around is largely sowed to flax and the crop is fine. He says that the country along the Soo near Anamoose and west of Harvey is rapidly settling up and a good class of buildings are going up on farms. The future of that part of the state seems to depend, as far as crops are concerned, on the flax crop, but at present that crop is in good shape. Wheat in that part of the state will also give a good yield and the farmers are figuring 25 and 30 bushels to the acre. There is a little smut noted in nearly all localities. No frost and not much hail have occurred. On the whole the country visited will have a very satisfactory, and in many places, a very large yield.—Alert.
