The following letter is taken from the Union Signal:
PROHIBITION IN NORTH DAKOTA.
Editor Union Signal:

Twelve years have passed since the prohibitory law (both constitutional and statutory) became operative in North Dakota. The experimental age has terminated. We are beginning to enjoy the fruits of our labors. Even those parts of the state where the law was openly violated are beginning to submit to the mandates of the statutes.

I have recently received letters from all the judges of the state, both supreme and district; from our members of congress and several leading journalists and citizens, regarding the success of the law in their part of the state. A composite statement of their views, in substance, is that middle and eastern and most thickly settled portions, the law is well enforced; that in the western and more sparsely settled districts, obedience to law has been tardy, but is now coming rapidly; that consumption of liquor has decreased; the morals of the people are better; crime is lessened; the effect upon the young is especially salutary; farmers are receiving special benefit in not having the open saloon at which their employes can congregate on rainy days; and the prosperity of the people is generally noted.

Fortunately the constitutional provision prevents those changes from one system to another, which so often renders impossible a thorough test of any system.

The state is filling up very rapidly from all parts of the union. It is yet too early to calculate what influence these new citizens will have upon the law. The friends of the law feel very much encouraged by the evident public sentiment in favor of its retention, coming from all parts of the state.
