



We pledge the nominees of this convention to a strict enforcement of the prohibitory law and Griggs county's members of the legislature to every effort to defeat resubmission.

Third. We are glad to welcome back to the republican party many heretofore populists who now find themselves without a party, being unwilling to be led into the democratic fold and march under the banner of free trade and the open saloons as advocated by the North Dakota democracy.


