A Strong Ticket! A Winning Ticket!

That's What the Republican County Convention Constructed Last Saturday Afternoon, You Bet!

Conceded by Everybody to be Made Up of The Best Men In the County It Must Come Out a Winner.

WE ARE PROUD OF OUR TICKET.

The republican party of Griggs county got a great boost in the minds of the people last Saturday when in convention assembled it nominated a set of county officers that are as good a set of men as you could pick out in the county, barring the county superintendent of schools, and a lady was renominated for that office. It is certainly a clean ticket from top to bottom and no republican need hesitate for one moment in putting a X at the head of the ticket this time. There were a total of 94 votes in the convention and out of that number 85 were represented, 78 being present in person. This is a great showing for the busy season and shows that there is lots of enthusiasm. Many faces were visible in the convention that had wandered away for the past few years, but had come back where they belonged, and they are gladly welcomed.

The convention was called to order by David Bartlett, chairman of the county committee and the call read by the secretary.

On motion made and seconded R. H. Belden was elected chairman and Russell Purinton secretary.

On motion chairman appointed the following committees:

Resolutions: David Bartlett, O. P. Fiering, Iver Udgard.

Credentials: S. J. Tande, Claus Jackson, A. M. Baldwin.

After recess committee on credentials reported which report was on motion adopted.

On motion duly carried, the temporary organization was made permanent, and order of business taken up as published in the call.

Committee on resolutions reported as follows:

Resolved, That the republicans of Griggs county are in favor of the enactment of a primary election law that shall secure to every elector the right to vote on the nomination of all state and county officers.

We are opposed to any act looking to the resubmission of the prohibition question. There is no room for the saloon in a North Dakota home or on North Dakota prairies. We pledge the nominees of this convention to a strict enforcement of the prohibitory law and Griggs county's members of the legislature to every effort to defeat resubmission.

Third. We are glad to welcome back to the republican party many heretofore populists who now find themselves without a party, being unwilling to be led into the democratic fold and march under the banner of free trade and the open saloons as advocated by the North Dakota democracy.

On motion the resolutions were adopted.

Moved and carried that a member of the central committee be elected from each precinct. The following county committee was elected:

The delegations from the different commissioner districts handed in the following nominations for county commissioners:

Dist. No. 5, O. S. Gunderson. The nominations were ratified by the convention.

Moved and carried that justices and constables be left to be filled by the county committee and also any other vacancy that may occur on the ticket.

Moved that the nomination for county surveyor be passed. Carried.

For county judge Hon. Will H. Carleton was nominated by acclamation. There is no question in the



minds of the people but what this selection is the best that could have been made. Judge Carleton's administration of the probate affairs of Griggs county have been such that the people will undoubtedly re-elect him to that position. It requires a lawyer to fill that office and fill it right, as many legal questions are coming before the court constantly.

Oscar D. Purinton was nominated for clerk of court. Mr. Purinton has the distinction of being the best clerk



in the district and has been so thoroughly appreciated that no doubt rests in our mind as to his re-election in November. He is the only old soldier on the ticket and we expect him to get a rousing majority.

For the office of county treasurer the republican party certainly nominated as competent a gentleman as could be found within the borders of the county in the person of

SEVAL FRISWOLD. For years he has had charge of the business end of John Syverson's large business and thoroughly competent in every detail. In addition to that he is a man of sterling worth and integrity and the people will make no mis-

take in electing him to that important office.

ROBERT M. COWEN is known from one end of Griggs county to the other and probably no man has won for himself more friends than our old friend "Bob." He was unanimously nominated for county auditor and his choice seems to please everybody. For 16 years he worked for the Northern Pacific as agent at Cooperstown and during that time he extended many kindnesses to the business men and farmers. He ought to get a big vote and be the next county auditor. His competency is unquestioned and his many sterling qualities are appreciated. Don't forget R. M. Cowen.

This the patient was unable to do and she was left to suffer great pain. Dr. Goldsmith is said to have had the lady taken to the train to be removed to Fargo that she might receive proper treatment. On the train happened to be Senator and Mrs. Cooper, who on learning the particulars of the case took the lady in charge, stopping long enough in Fargo to have her taken to Dr. Vidal's Hospital, where her suffering was alleviated.
