State Convention.

The 13th annual convention of the N. D., W. C. T. U. met at Wahpeton Sept. 26-28. 125 delegates were in attendance. The convention was in the beautiful new First Congregational church, whose artistic interior was enhanced by the various county banners hung about the walls. The motto "For God and Home and Native Land" in blue and white extended across the organ loft just back of the platform. Flowers decorated the president's desk and the platform with the faces of Miss Willard and Mrs. Stevens, national president on easels. The spirit of the convention seemed one of quiet confidence and unwavering purpose. President Anderson said in closing the convention that it had been the most spiritually helpful of any she had ever attended. A deficit in the state fund also one in the "Fargo Home" treasury amounting to about \$400 was speedily raised by personal pledges. An outsider remarked, "It is perfectly wonderful the way those women give." The average White Ribboner gives not alone on her intellect and affections to the cause but a liberal share of her purse as well. Twenty-six new unions have been organized. The state membership now numbers 2,228 with 695 honorary members, a gain of 525 members in all has been made during the year. 1149 total abstinence pledges have been signed.

One very encouraging feature lies in the increase of activity in the Loyal Temperance Legion Branch. There are sixty legions with 1200 members. The one drawback to the L. T. L. work is the difficulty to find leaders. The children are always ready to be taught and trained into temperance workers. It is the most hopeful and important feature of temperance work.

Miss Phelps and Miss Connett, the guests of the convention rendered most valuable assistance in the able addresses which they delivered.

The grand gold medal contest the last night of the convention drew out a crowded house. Mrs. Necla Buck of Cando was the winner of the medal. She also won the gold medal at last year's convention. Net receipts of the contest were \$42.55. The convention was so well reported in the Minneapolis Journal, the Fargo and Grand Forks papers that it is unnecessary to go into further detail.
