This transaction does not demonstrate any fear of an American invasion into Ontario, though some of the Canadian Anglomaniacs are already viewing with alarm the possibilities of the Americanization of Canada through American immigration. The more sensible take the view that if there is anything essentially Canadian worth maintaining, it will assert itself against the invasion.
