## THE COURIER.

Representative Cassell has made a splendid record again—which is nothing new for him. He is the man of all others who should have been speaker and had not this district handicapped him by getting on the wrong side of the senatorial fight he would have been speaker. We hope next time the district will get wise and not let soreheads dictate the policy of the district.

Barnes county should be proud of Representative Young one of the most brilliant legislators of the late session. Handicapped by every member of that Wisconsin grain commission being against him he succeeded in turning down LaMoure and his gang and passing the bill through the house with only six votes against it. He is a representative of the whole people and Barnes county should let him call for anything he wants. Mr. Young is a credit to his constituents and to the great state he represents.
